# Legislative Report

## **Hearing Schedule (March 6 - 10)**

Hearings of bills being tracked by the North Dakota Water Users Association for the next week are included in this report. We are tracking these bills because they have a direct or indirect impact on water issues.

# I. This Week at the Legislature

Legislators returned to the Capitol on Wednesday for the second half of session. Expenditures approved in appropriation bills prior to Crossover were \$512 million more than the estimated revenue for the 2017-2019 biennium. However, this is not unusual at this point in session.

The big news for next week is the new 2017-2019 revenue forecast, which will be presented to a joint meeting of the Senate and House Appropriations Committees Thursday morning.

HB 1026 was heard before the Senate Industry, Business and Labor Committee on Wednesday, March 1. The bill was introduced by Legislative Management at the request of the Economic Impact Interim Committee. The bill offers several changes to the One-Call Excavation Notice System (49-23). Interested parties worked over the interim to update the One-Call laws. A change that affects some Rural Water Systems relates to positive response. Positive response has now been defined as notification by the operator to the notification center that underground facilities within the area covered by a location request have been marked or cleared. Several groups provided testimony in support of the bill. There was no testimony in opposition and the Committee recommended a unanimous do pass as presented. The bill passed unanimously on the Senate floor on Friday, March 3.

**HB 1106** passed unanimously on the Senate floor on Wednesday, March 1. The bill clarifies the definitions of disasters and emergencies.

**HB 1111** passed unanimously on the Senate floor on Wednesday, March 1. The bill ensures that the NDDOT director has the authority to enter into agreement with the Fargo-Moorhead metropolitan area flood risk management project impacting the state interstate system. The agreement must address the construction and maintenance of the parts of the project which need to be constructed and maintained on the interstate system.

<u>SB 2262</u> was heard before the House Agriculture Committee on Thursday, March 2. Introduced by Sen. Terry Wanzek, the bill prevents a city, county or township to enact new or enforce existing fertilizer regulations.

SB 2047 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, March 2. While HB 1244 would not allow WRDs to use quick take, SB 2047 is the bill that was recommended by the Water Topics Interim Committee, which set forth procedures that WRDs would follow if they did exercise the quick take authority. WRDs supported those procedures, and also supported the Senate amendments which would require county commission approval before quick take could be used, after a public meeting with landowners. At the hearing on Thursday, March 2,

there was no opposition. However, WRDs that testified in support, including Burleigh, Richland, and Mike Dwyer, representing all of NDWRDs, asked the committee not to add the amendments which were added to HB 1244 that essentially prevented the use of quick take. The SWC again asked for clarification of the word "appropriation", and Rep. George Keiser asked if the words "made available" would be workable to clarify any uncertainty. It appeared that both the SWC and WRDs supported the proposed wording change. As stated, there was no opposition, so we hope SB 2047 can be approved with just the minor wording change relating to appropriation, and sent back to the Senate for concurrence.

SB 2239 was heard before the House Transportation Committee on Thursday, March 2. The bill creates an exception for watercraft owned and operated by a guide to forgo annual boat inspections by the N.D. Game and Fish Department. The committee unanimously recommended a do pass.

SB 2259 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, March 2. The bill allows a nonresident to buy a waterfowl license that is valid for three periods of four consecutive days. The fee for this license would be \$200 and \$50 must be used for the Private Land Open to Sportsmen (PLOTS) program. There was no testimony in support and a representative from the Cass County Wildlife Federation testified in opposition. The committee took no action at the time of the hearing.

HB 1191 was heard before the Senate Political Subdivisions Committee on Thursday, March 2. Introduced by Rep. Lawrence R. Klemin, the bill clarifies who can sign loan agreements on behalf of political subdivisions. The loan agreement must be signed by two different officers, the president, chairman or equivalent officer and by the political subdivision's auditor, business manager, secretary or equivalent officer. The committee recommended a unanimous do pass.

SB 2308 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, March 2. The bill allows an ice fish house and a coyote snare to be identified by a registration number provided by the Game and Fish Department. No action was taken by the committee.

<u>SB 2327</u> was heard before the Hose Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, March 3. Introduced by Sen. Jessica Unruh, the bill transfers the duties and responsibilities of the State Department of Health relating to environmental quality to a newly established Department of Environmental Quality. The transition would take place over the next two years.

HB 1374 was heard before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, March 3. Rep. Jim Schmidt provided the supporting testimony for HB 1374, which would require economic and life cycle analysis of projects cost shared by the SWC, would prohibit cost sharing by the SWC for improvement of conveyance projects (defined as surface and subsurface drainage, snagging and clearing, and related items), and require the SWC to meet every other month, and would require that the Governor appoint SWC members by river basin. WRDs testified in opposition to the provisions relating to prohibiting cost sharing on drainage improvements. The SWC expressed concern about the meetings and appointments. Others also testified in opposition.

<u>HCR 3020</u> was heard before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, March 3. The resolution urges Congress and the President to allow the continuation of the Garrison Diversion project canal system to aid in the delivery of water to the Red River Valley.

HCR 3021 was heard before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, March 3. The resolution urges Congress and the President to allow the utilization of Garrison Diversion Unit facilities, including the McClusky Canal and the Snake Creek pumping plant, to assist in supplying water to eastern and central North Dakota. The resolution also asks to not deauthorize or

repurpose any part of GDCD.

HB 1367 was heard before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, March 3. The bill would not require an observer on a personal watercraft while towing an individual on water skis, a kneeboard or an inflatable craft if the personal watercraft is equipped with a mirror on each side that provides the operator an unobstructed field of vision to the rear. It would allow an individual who is 16 years of age or older to windsurf or board sail without wearing a personal floatation device and prohibits water skiing or surfboarding between one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise. The committee recommended a unanimous do pass immediately following the hearing.
