# Legislative Report

## **Hearing Schedule (March 13-17)**

Hearings of bills being tracked by the North Dakota Water Users Association for the next week are included in this report. We are tracking these bills because they have a direct or indirect impact on water issues.

### I. Revised Revenue Forecast Presented by OMB

On Thursday morning, Governor Burgum kicked off the presentation of the revised state revenue forecast before a joint meeting of the House and Senate Appropriations Committees. He commented on the historic budget challenges facing this legislature and commended legislators for their work to date. He acknowledged that decisions going forward would be even more difficult as the revised revenue forecast reduces general fund revenue from the January legislative forecast by \$46.4 million for the current biennium and by \$103.2 million for the 2017-2019 biennium. Burgum suggested costsaving measures presented in his budget recommendation should be considered, including state employees contributing 5 percent to health care premiums and the transfer of more than the current \$300 million in oil revenue to the general fund.

OMB Director Pam Sharp presented the <u>detailed revenue forecast</u>, noting that revenues forecast for the 2017-2019 biennium are similar to actual revenues in Fiscal Years 2011 and 2012. The most significant general fund adjustment from the January legislative forecast is a reduction in sales tax, including \$43.6 million less in the current biennium and \$94.3 million less in the 2017-2019 biennium. However, oil tax revenues are expected to increase, up \$12.7 million for the current biennium and \$92.5 million for the 2017-2019 biennium.

Dan White of Moody's Analytics concluded the presentation by discussing the <u>assumptions</u> used to develop the forecast.

Both Appropriations Committees must now determine whether to accept the revised revenue forecast or further reduce it in order to continue their work to balance the budget.

#### II. This Week at the Legislature

<u>HB 1345</u> was heard by the Senate Judiciary Committee on Monday, March 6. The committee recommended a unanimous do pass and the bill passed unanimously on the Senate floor on Thursday, March 9. The bill amends various sections and subsections of Century Code relating to open record and meeting laws.

HB 1351 was heard before the Senate Finance and Taxation Committee on Wednesday, March 8. Introduced by Rep. Andrew G. Maragos, the bill requires state, county, city, township, school, water and park district taxes and special assessments to be levied or voted in specific amounts of money by the majority of the elected members of the related governing body. The committee took no action at the time of the hearing.

SB 2259 failed on the House floor on Wednesday, March 8 with a vote of 30-63. The bill would have allowed a nonresident to buy a waterfowl license that is valid for three periods of four

consecutive days. The fee for this license would be \$200, and \$50 must be used for the PLOTS program. Current law allows nonresidents to purchase a license lasting fourteen consecutive days or two periods of seven consecutive days.

<u>SB 2269</u> was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, March 9. Introduced by Sen. Terry Wanzek, the bill offers several minor changes to the powers and authorities of the GDCD and the LAWA. Highlights of the changes are as follows:

- o Allowing the GDCD to use the Public Finance Authority as a source of funding.
- o Adding central N.D. to the scope of the project and adding two board of director's positions to represent central N.D. (one water district and one city from west of N.D. Highway 1).
- o Further defining system eligibility for voting and being elected to the board.
- o Adding the ability to use weighted voting based on nomination capacity.
- o Shifting the intent of the project from a federal project to a state and local one.

Merri Mooridian representing GDCD, and Mike Dwyer representing NDWUA, testified in support. The committee amended language from "may" to "shall" on page three, line 28, to ensure entities joining the project late pay an additional fee. The committee recommended a unanimous do pass to the amended bill following the hearing.

SB 2270 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, March 9. The bill authorizes GDCD and LAWA to work with the N.D. Public Finance Authority to finance various projects. The bill also eliminates public hearings if the board receives written consent from each affected landowner to the levy assessments. Merri Mooridian, GDCD, Mike Dwyer, NDWUA, and a representative from the N.D. Public Finance Authority testified in support. The committee had numerous questions relating to financing and requested more information from the N.D. Public Finance Authority. Therefore, the committee took no action at the time of the hearing.

<u>SB 2178</u> was heard before the House Political Subdivisions Committee on Thursday, March 9. Introduced by Sen. Donald Schaible, the bill expands the infrastructure revolving loan fund program to include the replacement of existing infrastructure. Currently, Century Code only includes fund programing for new infrastructure. The committee recommended a unanimous do pass directly following the hearing.

HCR 3019 was heard before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, March 9. The resolution looks to return the land no longer required for the Pick-Sloan Missouri Basin Project dam at Lake Sakakawea to the original landowners. The committee took no action at the time of the hearing.

SB 2327 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Subcommittee on Friday, March 10. Introduced by Sen. Jessica Unruh, the bill transfers the duties and responsibilities of the State Department of Health relating to environmental quality to a newly established Department of Environmental Quality. The transition would take place over the next two years. Dave Glatt, Environmental Health Section Chief of the Department of Health, was present to answer questions from the committee.

SB 2134 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, March 10. Introduced by Sen. Kelly Armstrong, the bill changes definition of sovereign minerals within Missouri River reservoirs. The bill would reduce the acres that the state claims mineral ownership to within the Missouri River based on the high water mark by returning those acres back to the original owners.

<u>HB 1390</u> was heard before the Senate Agriculture Committee on Friday, March 10. Besides Rep. Craig Headland and Sen. Terry Wanzek, Water Resource Districts, Rural Water Systems, and the

SWC testified in support of a proposal to utilize SB 2263 as the lead bill on tile drainage and make some minor amendments. The SWC would like to keep the "statewide significance" requirement, and rural water systems need a provision that allows a condition to keep tile projects outside the easements for rural water systems. The committee will work to reconcile HB 1390 and SB 2263.

HB 1409 was heard before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, March 10. Introduced by Rep. Marvin Nelson, the bill relates to well water testing preceding subsurface mineral production and liability for damages to water supply. The bill also instructs results of all tests to be reported to the State Department of Health which would be entered into a database.

<u>HB 1385</u> was heard before the Senate Political Subdivisions Committee on Friday, March 10. Introduced by Rep. Lawrence Klemin, the bill defines the process of refunding bonds for municipalities.
