Legislative Report

Hearing Schedule (March 27-31)

Hearings of bills being tracked by the North Dakota Water Users Association for the next week are included in this report. We are tracking these bills because they have a direct or indirect impact on water issues.

I. This Week at the Legislature

There are a few hearings on next week's schedule as most policy committees finished hearing bills this week. Remaining bills will likely be moved out of policy committees next week with the final deadline of April 6. The heavy lifting remains with the Appropriations Committees as they continue hearings on agency bills and rereferred bills from policy committees, along with significant committee work. Conference committees may start next week.

SB 2146 passed unanimously on the House floor on Monday, March 20. The bill increases the public improvement bidding threshold from \$100,000 to \$150,000. The current bid threshold was last increased in 1997. Last session, the engineering/architect threshold was increased from \$100,000 to \$150,000.

<u>SB 2236</u> passed on the House floor on Monday, March 20 with a vote of 80-11. The bill instructs the agriculture commissioner to establish a program to provide technical assistance and support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline restoration and follow up support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline reclamation.

HB 1054 was heard before the Senate Appropriations Committee on Tuesday, March 21. Introduced by Rep. Jeff Delzer, the bill relates to the cancellation of unexpended appropriations. The new language gives clarity to carry over fund authority. The majority leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives and the chairmen of the Senate and House Appropriations Committees with the Office of Budget and Management may continue appropriations or balances in force for not more than two years after the expiration of the biennial period. The Office of Management and Budget must provide the appropriation continuation requests to the legislative council one week prior to the meeting where requests are considered. The committee took no action at the time of the hearing.

SB 2280 failed on the House floor on Monday, March 20 and was later reconsidered and then passed on the House floor on Tuesday, March 21. The bill was reconsidered again, and failed on the House floor on Wednesday, March 22 with a vote of 42-49. The bill would have allowed cities to levy taxes for emergency purposes, such as snow removal, natural disasters and other emergency conditions, based on the population of the city.

<u>SB 2147</u> passed unanimously on the House floor on Tuesday, March 21. The bill eliminates the double bond issue that faces contractors today. The new bill language makes it explicitly clear that the construction manager would carry a bond that is at least equal to the cost of the guaranteed maximum price of the project. The subcontractors would not be required to carry a bond.

SB 2270 passed on the House floor on Tuesday, March 21 with a 78-14 vote. The bill authorizes

GDCD and LAWA to work with the N.D. Public Finance Authority to finance various projects. The bill also eliminates public hearings if the board receives written consent from each affected landowner to the levy assessments.

HB 1339 passed on the Senate floor on Tuesday, March 21 with a 46-1 vote. Introduced by Rep. Kathy Skroch, the bill relates to notification and appeal process for special assessments levied for water drainage projects. In section one, the bill was amended to change the publication of the assessment from two successive weeks to three successive weeks and the hearing date cannot be scheduled less than 30 days from the mailing notice, opposed to the original 20 day requirement. In section two, the requirement for appeals of assessment projects to the state engineer was decreased from 25 percent to 15 percent. Section three dictates publishing notice of the hearing in the official county newspaper once per week for three consecutive weeks beginning at least three days before the hearing. The notification that is mailed to landowners must be clearly marked as an assessment notice.

<u>HB 1336</u> passed unanimously on the Senate floor on Tuesday, March 21. The bill defines procedures of environmental or health safety audits.

<u>HB 1055</u> passed on the Senate floor on Tuesday, March 21 with a 34-13 vote. This bill increases the revenue bond authority of water resource districts from \$10 million to \$50 million.

<u>HB 1165</u> was heard before the Senate Appropriations Committee on Wednesday, March 22. Introduced by Rep. Toman, the bill relates to transparency of state grants. The committee reported back a unanimous do not pass recommendation.

HB 1322 passed unanimously on the Senate floor on Wednesday, March 21. The bill relates to authority and procedure when financing special improvements and township bonding authority.

SB 2262 passed on the House floor on Wednesday, March 21 with an 82-11 vote. The bill prevents a city, county or township to enact new or enforce existing fertilizer regulations.
