Legislative Report

Hearing Schedule (January 30 – February 3).

Hearings of bills being tracked by the North Dakota Water Users Association for the next week are included in this report. We are tracking these bills because they have a direct or indirect impact on water issues.

I. This Week at the Legislature

This past Monday marked the final day for introduction of bills and yesterday was the final day for resolutions, except amendments to the state constitution and study resolutions. To date, 778 bills and 20 resolutions are being considered this session. Next week policy committees will be focused on completing work on bills with appropriations, as these bills must be rereferred to appropriations committees by Feb. 6.

Governor Burgum's <u>detailed budget proposal</u> is now available online. Appropriations committees have started the process of killing the bills with former Governor Dalrymple¢s agency budget recommendations. The agency baseline appropriation bills introduced by the legislature will be the ones moved forward in the process.

HB 1349 was heard before the House Finance and Taxation Committee on Monday, January 23. Introduced by Rep. Dick Anderson the bill would provide incentive for pipeline companies to install leak detection systems on existing pipelines and new pipelines. Ron Ness, president of the ND Petroleum Council testified in support of the bill and spoke briefly about continually looking for better solutions due to the advancement of technology. The committee recommended a do not pass with a 9-3-2 vote.

HB 1191 passed on the House floor, 89-0 on Monday, January 23. The bill would clarify who can sign loan agreements on the behalf of political subdivisions. The loan agreement must be signed on behalf of the political subdivision by the president, chairman or equivalent officer and also by the political subdivision auditor, business manager, secretary or equivalent officer.

SB 2178 passed on the Senate floor, 45-0 on Tuesday, January 24. The bill would expand infrastructure revolving loan fund program to include the replacement of existing infrastructure. Currently, Century Code only includes fund programing for new infrastructure.

<u>HB 1326</u> was heard before the House Finance and Taxation Committee on Wednesday, January 25. Introduced by Rep. Tom Kading this bill would allow political subdivisions to opt in or opt out of local property tax incentives. The ND Watchdog Network testified in support. The ND League of Cities and the City of Mandan testified in opposition.

HB 1298 was heard before the House Government and Veterans Affairs Committee on Thursday, January 26. The bill prohibits counties, cities and townships from hiring a contract lobbyist. It also prohibits associations from hiring a contract lobbyist. The League of Cities and Fargo city attorney testified in opposition. No action was taken by committee.

SB 2245 was heard before the Senate Agriculture Committee on Thursday, January 26. The bill

would allow landowners to mitigate activities with wetlands established on state lands. Water resource districts and others testified in support of the proposal, while wildlife interest testified in opposition.

SB 2227 and SB 2259 were introduced by Sen. Jerry Klein before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, Jan. 26. SB 2227 would entitle a nonresident age 65 or older to purchase up to two nonresident waterfowl hunting licenses per year, with \$100 of the fee for the second license used for private land open to sportsmen program. The second license would cost \$150. SB 2259 would allow a nonresident to buy a waterfowl license that is valid for three periods of four consecutive days. The fee for this license would be \$200 and \$50 must be used for the private land open to sportsmen program. A Bismarck resident, the ND Wildlife Federation and the Cass County Wildlife Club testified in opposition of both bills. Division Chief of the Wildlife Division of the ND Game and Fish Department, Jeb Williams spoke neutrally and provided the committee with statistics in regard to the bill. The committee recommended a do not pass to SB 2227 with a 7-0-0 vote and a do pass to SB 2259 with a 4-3-0 vote.

<u>SB 2239</u> was heard before the Senate Transportation Committee on Thursday, January 26. The bill would create an exception for watercraft owned and operated by a guide to forgo annual boat inspections by the ND Game and Fish Department. Woodland Resort of Devils Lake and the ND Game and Fish Department testified in support of SB 2239. The committee took no action at the time of the hearing.

SB 2263 was heard before the Senate Agriculture Committee on Thursday, January 26 in an almost day-long hearing. The bill would dramatically change the law regarding permitting of tile drainage. Currently, the law provides that projects exceeding 80 acres of land (not a watershed) require a permit from the local water resource district. The water resource district is allowed to impose some conditions and can evaluate impacts downstream of a proposed project not to exceed one mile, projects which drain into assessments drains or ponds through lakes that do not require flowage easements. SB 2263 would remove the authority of water resource districts to impose any conditions, would place the burden for the analysis of any downstream impacts on the downstream landowner, and would limit fees to \$100.00 and other changes. Most of the testimony in support was actually in support of tile drainage. Two witnesses testified about problems they are having with water resources districts and in both if those instances there are two sides of the story. Mike Dwyer testified for the Water Resources Districts Association, Monica Zentgraf testified for the Richland County Water Resource District, Arv Burbee also testified along with various other witnesses in opposition. At the conclusion of opposition testimony, Sen. Klein requested that the attorney for Ellingson Tile Company, who drafted SB 2263, to explain the company reasons for proposing the legislation. The Attorney was given extensive opportunity and while his testimony was reported to be neutral, it was clearly an explanation in support of SB 2263. ND Water Resource Districts will be working with the committee and others to hopefully propose amendments that are acceptable to all parties.

The Senate Ag Committee discussed SB 2263 on Friday, January 27 in committee. Sen. Osland said perhaps there should be no acre limit, in other words, a permit should be required for all tile drainage. Sen. Larsen said he would like a definition for both the words "investigation" and "tile drainage". He said it should be called subsurface water management, rather than subsurface drainage. Sen. Myrdal seemed to agree that water resource districts are not in compliance in all areas, and perhaps have more authority than they should. Sen. Klein stated the bill was very simple and was simply clarifying the uncertainty. The committee adjourned without taking any action.

SB 2229 was heard before the Senate Political Subdivisions on Thursday, January 26. Introduced by Sen. Rich Wardner, the bill would allow the majority leader of the Senate to appoint a member of the Senate and the majority leader of the House to appoint of member of the House of Representatives to

the Red River Basin Commission. Adding a new section to chapter 54-03 of Century Code would mandate by law that appointees would be compensated for their time. The committee had a numerous questions in regard to compensation. The committee took no action at the time of the hearing.

HB 1317 was heard before the House Appropriations Committee on Thursday, January 26. Introduced by Rep. Vicky Steiner, the bill would transfer any legacy fund earrings to the general fund immediately by the state treasurer to the tax relief fund. The balance for tax relief would not exceed the amount given in the most recent legislative session. The intent of this bill would be to utilize earrings of the legacy fund for tax relief programs. No action was taken by the committee.

HB 1162 The House Industry Business and Labor Committee recommended a do pass to amended HB 1162 on Thursday, January 26. The bill would allow a study regarding competition between government and the private industry during the 2017-2018 interim.

<u>SB 2262</u> was heard before the Senate Agriculture Committee on Friday, January 27. Introduced by Sen. Terry M. Wanzek the bill would prevent a city, county or township to enact new or enforce existing fertilizer regulations. The committee recommended a unanimous do pass.

SB 2269 was heard before the Senate Agriculture Committee on Friday, January 27. The bill was introduced by Sen. Terry M. Wanzek at the request of the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District (GDCD) and the Lake Agassiz Water Authority (LAWA). The bill offers several minor changes to the powers and authorities of the GDCD and the LAWA. Ken Vein, Chairman of the GDCD gave testimony in support of the changes. Highlights of the changes are as follows:

- Allowing the GDCD to use the Public Finance Authority as a source of funding.
- Adding central ND to the scope of the project and adding two board of directorøs positions to represent central ND (one water district and one city from west of state highway 1).
- Further defining system eligibility for voting and being elected to the board.
- Adding the ability to use weighted voting based on nomination capacity.
- Shifting the intent of the project from a Federal project to a State and Local one.

Minor grammatical amendments were offered by the sponsor. Mike Dwyer testified in support on behalf of the ND Water Users Association. There was no testimony in opposition and the committee recommended a unanimous do pass as amended.

<u>SB 2280</u> was heard before the Senate Political Subdivisions Committee on Friday, January 27. Introduced by Sen. Robert Erbele the bill would allow cities to levy taxes for emergency purposes, such as snow removal, natural disasters and other emergency conditions, based on the population of the city. The bill would ensure smaller cities have an adequate emergency fund. The committee recommended a unanimous do pass.
