Legislative Report

Hearing Schedule (February 13 – 17).

Hearings of bills being tracked by the North Dakota Water Users Association for the next week are included in this report. We are tracking these bills because they have a direct or indirect impact on water issues.

I. This Week at the Legislature

With two weeks until Crossover, most policy committees have completed their work on bills originating in their chamber and some have begun hearing bills approved by the opposite chamber. Much work remains in appropriations committees as they work to reconcile multiple budget recommendations for agency and other appropriation bills. OMB's Advisory Committee on Revenue Forecasting is expected to meet in late February or early March before the final revenue forecast of the session is delivered, likely on Thursday, March 9.

<u>HB 1331</u> was defeated on the House floor on Tuesday, February 7 with a 10-79 vote. The bill would require the ND Plumbing Board to inspect and certify all private sewage disposal systems in the state which is currently done at the local level.

HB 1351 passed on the House floor on Tuesday, February 7 with a 51-38 vote. The bill would require state, county, city, township, school, water and park district taxes and special assessments to be levied or voted in specific amounts of money by the majority of the elected members of the related governing body.

<u>SB 2239</u> passed on the Senate floor on Tuesday, February 7 with a 44-0 vote. The bill would create an exception for watercraft owned and operated by a guide to forgo annual boat inspections by the ND Game and Fish Department.

HB 1114 was defeated on the House floor on Wednesday, February 8 with a 1-90 vote. The bill would change license fees for plumbers and sewer and water installers.

<u>SB 2134</u> passed on the Senate floor on Wednesday, February 8 with a 37-9 vote. The bill changes the definition of sovereign minerals within the Missouri River reservoirs.

HB 1106 was heard before the Senate Political Subdivisions Committee on Thursday, February 9. Introduced by the Political Subdivisions Committee at the request of the Adjutant General, the bill clearly defines disasters and emergencies. The bill was passed on the House Floor with an 86-5 vote on January 12.

HCR 3019 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, February 9. Introduced by Rep. Terry B. Jones, the resolution looks to return the land no longer required for the Pick-Sloan Missouri Basin Project dam at Lake Sakakawea to the original landowners. The ND Stockmen's Association testified in support. The committee took no action at the time of the hearing.

HCR 3020 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday,

February 9. Introduced by Rep. Jeff Delzer, the resolution urges Congress and the President to allow the continuation of the Garrison Diversion project canal system to aid in the delivery of water to the Red River Valley. Jon Olson testified in support on behalf of GDCD. The committee recommended a do pass with a 12-0-2 vote.

HCR 3021 was heard before the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, February 9. The resolution urges Congress and the President to allow the utilization of Garrison Diversion Unit facilities, including the McClusky Canal and the Snake Creek pumping plant to assist in supplying water to eastern and central North Dakota. The resolution also asks to not deauthorize or repurpose any part of GDCD. Jon Olson testified in support on behalf of GDCD. The committee recommended a do pass with a 13-0-1 vote.

<u>HB 1322</u> was heard before the House Political Subdivisions Committee on Thursday, February 9. Introduced by Rep. Dick Anderson, the bill relates to financing special improvements and township bonding authority.

HB 1317 failed on the House floor on Thursday, February 9 with a 4-87 vote. The bill would transfer any legacy fund earrings to the general fund immediately by the state treasurer to the tax relief fund. The balance for tax relief would not exceed the amount given in the most recent legislative session. The intent of this bill would be to utilize earrings of the legacy fund for tax relief programs.

SB 2236 was heard before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, February 9. Introduced by Sen. Jessica Unruh, the bill would mandate the agriculture commissioner to establish a program to provide technical assistance and support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline restoration and reclamation.

HB 1390 was heard before the House Agriculture Committee on Friday, February 9. Testimony in support was presented by ND Farm Bureau and Ellingson Tile Company. They were very critical of the Sheridan County Water Resource District, and fortunately, two members of the Sheridan Water Resource District were there to defend themselves and present their side of the water story. Opponents to the bill were ND Water Resource Districts and ND Rural Water Systems. The Committee took no action.

HB 1111 was heard before the Senate Transportation Committee on Friday, February 9. Bill Fode, Director of Project Development for the ND Department of Transportation (NDDOT) introduced the bill. The bill is to ensure the NDDOT director has the authority to enter agreement for the Fargo Moorhead metropolitan area flood risk management project impacting the state interstate system. The agreement must address the construction and maintenance of the parts of the project which need to be constructed and maintained on the interstate system. The committee questioned the language of the bill and suggested widening the bill to apply to other areas, not just the Fargo Moorhead metropolitan area. Chad Peterson, Cass County Commissioner District 1, testified in support of the bill. Previously, the bill passed on the House floor with an 83-9 vote.

SB 2327 was heard before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Friday, February 9. Introduced by Sen. Jessica Unruh the bill would transfer duties and responsibilities of the State Department of Health relating to environmental quality to a newly established Department of Environmental Quality. The transition would take place over the next two years. Claire Ness from Legislative Council walked the committee through the near 150 page bill. The bulk of the bill is relocating sections of ND Century Code. Acting Co-Director of the ND Department of Health, Dave Glatt testified in favor of the bill. Justin Dever, representing the ND EmPower Commission and Ed Murphy, representing the ND Geological Survey – Department of Mineral Resources also testified in support. Pete Hanebutt, representing the ND Farm Bureau, testified in opposition.
