With more than 3,500 members, WaterISAC – the Water Information Sharing and Analysis Center – provides homeland security and emergency response information to water and wastewater systems and agencies that support critical infrastructure protection. The Center is a nonprofit organization



created in 2002 and overseen by a board of water and wastewater system managers, each appointed by one of the national water associations. It's the official operational and communication arm of the water sector, and the only service of its kind.


Free 12-month memberships are available through the end of this month. The memberships are covered by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, but after this month no more trial memberships will be available.

A pro membership is essential for those whose jobs entail utility management, government management, water security, emergency response, information technology, and SCADA (Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition), water quality, intelligence, or law enforcement.

WaterISAC's mission is to provide water and wastewater utilities and federal, state, and local government agencies responsible for water security with the information and tools needed to prevent, detect, respond to and recover from all hazards. It does this through urgent threat alerts to members via e-mail; analysis of threats and security incidents at utilities; suspicious activity reports; and a large searchable online library of best practices, guides, and white papers. Some of the material provided includes sensitive information from federal agencies.

Among WaterISAC's most popular services are free webcasts and webinars on topics such as cyber threats, insider threats, public crisis communications, and emergency response. They include case studies and lessons learned from actual incidents. The Center also provides quick access to chemical and biological contaminant databases and risk assessment tools.

Many Benefits Available to NDRWSA Members

- The North Dakota Rural Water Systems Association (NDRWSA) provides on-site training and technical assistance.
 What does that mean? Trained staff will arrive at a location and provide site-specific problem assistance for potable and wastewater systems.

- NDRWSA has equipment available for member use. Staff will provide the electric valve operator, valve key set, delivery of the equipment, and instructions for proper equipment operating procedures.
- NDRWSA provides valve and curb-stop location, hydrant repair, flow testing, poly-pigging, and lagoon sludge testing.

- NDRWSA offers the Source Water Protection Program, which involves preventing the pollution of groundwater, lakes, rivers, and streams that serve as sources of drinking water for local communities.
